# Implementing Strategy into Action – First Year Results of the Office for Rare Conditions, Glasgow

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#### Introduction

Scotland launched a Rare Disease Implementation Plan in 2014. Awareness of this plan at the Royal Hospital for Children (RHC) Glasgow which is the largest children's hospital in Scotland is limited. For rare endocrine conditions, bone conditions and epilepsy, the hospital is an endorsed health care provider within its corresponding European Reference Network (ERN).


#### The Office for Rare Conditions, Glasgow

promote participation in multi-centre research, an Office for Rare Conditions was developed in 2017 with seed corn funding from the Glasgow Children's Hospital Charity.







